

This map demonstrates the wide-reaching impact The Georgia Trust has had in rural, urban and suburban communities throughout Georgia during Fiscal Year 2006.

- ◆ Preservation Assistance aid to 275 individuals and organizations in 105 cities.
- The Revolving Fund for Endangered Properties made important contributions to historic preservation.
- + Heritage Education/ *Talking Walls* workshops in 14 counties trained 100 teachers who reached 2,000+ students.
- The Main Street program conducted 55 site visits, 173 consults and produced 57 renderings for business owners in 24 Main Street cities.
- ★ The 2006 *Places in Peril* list brought attention to hundreds of similar sites in distress throughout Georgia.

A YEAR IN REVIEW: Meeting Today's Challenges While Staying Focused on the Future

Fiscal Year 2006 has been a year of great accomplishments and great challenges. While raising \$1.75 million in capital funds, the Trust has been challenged as never before in raising day-to-day operating funds.

Through Main Street and its design assistance, downtowns throughout Georgia have continued to thrive in the last quarter century. Yet, sales of properties through our Revolving Fund for Endangered Properties declined with the current residential market.

The Trust led in the development of a series of highly successful heritage tourism workshops throughout the state and Governor Perdue chose heritage tourism as the key element of his term as chairman of the Southern Governor's Association.

Visitors to Georgia rated historic sites as their number one tourist destination, yet, due to different patterns of travel, fewer visitors visited our house museums and historic attractions throughout the country.

In 2006 the Trust launched a highly successful new initiative, *Places in Peril*, and received coverage from over 100 national news outlets and from even more statewide outlets as a result of placing Auburn Avenue in Atlanta on the inaugural list.

The Legislature secured a Georgia Historic Preservation License Plate, with revenues dedicated to preservation in Georgia, provided that 1,000 plates are pre-sold before it is issued.

The Trust was certified to offer professional training to teachers by the Department of Education and to architects by the American Institute of Architects. And we trained both teachers and building professionals from throughout the state.

Hay House, the Trust's crown jewel, continues to be improved with the completion of a roof that will last another 100 years and installation of a rain water system that will help dry out the ground floor of the house. Landscaping is under restoration and the interior continues to be restored, room by room. The house hasn't looked better in a generation.

In the midst of innumerable preservation successes, we have new challenges before us. The market we have created in downtowns is now attracting franchisees who wish to demolish historic buildings in favor of set back suburban drive through operations. And while once we were the only option for neighborhood revitalization, teardowns and "McMansions" now threaten even the most historic areas.

At the same time that more Americans understand and support the preservation of our history, an increasing and erroneous number declare that all property rights reside with the owner, whatever the impact in the surrounding community.

THE STRATEGIC PLAN

In Fiscal Year 2006 (Apr. 1, 2005-Mar. 31, 2006) The Georgia Trust continued to focus on its Mission: to promote an appreciation of Georgia's diverse historic resources and provide for their protection and use to preserve, enhance and revitalize Georgia's communities.

Placement on The Georgia Trust's inaugural *Places in Peril* list focused national attention on Auburn Avenue in Atlanta. The list of 10 endangered properties throughout Georgia that represented hundreds of others, generated the equivalent of \$1 million in news media coverage as it focussed attention on historic structures throughout the state in need of immediate attention.

The map on the inside front cover graphically demonstrates the wide-reaching impact the Georgia Trust for Historic Preservation has had in rural, urban and suburban communities throughout Georgia during FY 2006. The box below the map summarizes the Trust's impact in five categories; Preservation Assistance; The Revolving Fund for Endangered Properties; Heritage Education/ *Talking Walls*; the Main Street program; and, *Places in Peril*.

The Georgia Trust for Historic Preservation accomplishes its mission by developing and implementing the organization's strategic plan. This plan is framed by both the Trust's mission and the following broad-based goals:

- ⇒ Increase the number of historic buildings, places and related landscapes that are protected, preserved and actively used across the state;
- ⇒ Broaden understanding of the enormous economic

impact of preservation as an essential tool for community revitalization and quality of life enhancement;

- ⇒ Expand the preservation constituency through increasing public awareness, demonstrating integral relationships and forging partnerships with other fields to build a strong and active membership;
- ⇒ Collect best preservation practices and disseminate to the organization's statewide audiences; and;
- ⇒ Employ the resources of Georgia's historic built environment and related landscapes as the most effective means of bringing the relevance of history to the daily lives of Georgians.

Under these Mission Goals are the more specific Strategic Goals, toward which the efforts of the Trust Board, staff and volunteers are directed over a three-

2006 STRATEGIC ACCOMPLISHMENTS

A summary by strategic goal of the Trust's accomplishments during FY 2006 follows:

GOAL I.

PRESERVE INDIVIDUAL HISTORIC PROPERTIES

REVOLVING FUND FOR ENDANGERED PROPERTIES

- ⇒ Sold c. 1800 Rossiter-Little House, Sparta to preservation-minded buyers.
- ⇒ Acquired c. 1854 Cowen House, Acworth through donation from Acworth Historic Preservation Society.
- ⇒ Acquired options to purchase c. 1825 Gachet House, Barnesville, c. 1805 Cabaniss House, Jones County and c. 1837 Stovall House, Sautee-Nacoochee Valley.

PRESERVATION ASSISTANCE

- ⇒ Helped facilitate positive solution for c. 1883 Peters House in Atlanta through donation by its owner to Savannah College of Art & Design-Atlanta (SCAD).

PROPERTIES

- ⇒ Hay House *Exterior*: restored two types of stained-glass windows, roof and interior gutters, and installed French drains. *Interior*: reproduced reception room wallpaper and furnishings, and conserved three paintings. *Landscape*: restored retaining walls and sidewalks, added irrigation, planned formal garden restoration.

- ⇒ Restored decorative ceiling in Rhodes Hall library and parquet floor in the den.



⇒ Worked with state and local partners to promote revitalization of Auburn Avenue.

HERITAGE TOURISM

- ⇒ Analyzed Watson Brown survey of Historic House Museums and Sites to help create a workshop series on heritage tourism.
- ⇒ Conducted a series of five two-day statewide heritage tourism workshops, partnering with the Tourism Division, the Department of Economic Development, and the Historic Preservation Division, Department of Natural Resources. Attended by over 400 tourism, Main Street and museum professionals as well as community volunteers.

GOAL III.

DEMONSTRATE PRESERVATION LEADERSHIP IN GEORGIA

- ⇒ Launched *Places in Peril* by announcing 10 sites on the Trust's inaugural 2006 list. Annually, the Trust will seek to identify significant historic, archaeological and cultural resources threatened by demolition, neglect, lack of maintenance, inappropriate development or insensitive public policy. The retail value of free news media coverage exceeded \$1 million.
- ⇒ Coordinated a legislative reception for the Georgia General Assembly, as well as visits to the nation's Capital to meet with a Congressional delegation.
- ⇒ Supported the Georgia historic preservation license plate initiative.
- ⇒ Helped to successfully advocate the retention of federal funds for preservation through the U.S. Department of Transportation's transportation

enhancement program.

- ⇒ Presented 19 Georgia Preservation Awards, which included the Mary Gregory Jewett Award, the Georgia Trust's highest honor, to architect Eugene Surber.
- ⇒ Worked with the Southeastern Museums Conference on the annual meeting at Jekyll Island, and with the American Association for State and Local History to establish new standards for house museums.
- ⇒ Co-hosted with the National Trust, the 2006 Southern Region Advisors and Partners Meeting at Jekyll Island and Better Board Training for local Georgia Preservation Non Profit Partners (GPNP) staff and board leadership.
- ⇒ Coordinated the fall GPNP meeting co-hosted by Historic Macon Foundation.
- ⇒ Participated in the: Georgia Downtown Association board of directors and annual conference; Department of Transportation's Transportation Enhancement Advisory Committee; Atlanta Regional Commission's Livable Center Advisory Committee; Association of Preservation Technology's Atlanta conference committee; Georgia Cities Foundation Board of Advisors; and, Governor's Conference on Tourism keynote speaker arrangements.

GOAL IV.**EDUCATE IDENTIFIED AUDIENCES OF GEORGIANS AND VISITORS ABOUT THE VALUE OF HISTORIC PRESERVATION**

- ⇒ Accredited by the American Institute of Architects to provide continuing professional education credits to architects in Trust seminars on historic preservation.
- ⇒ Certified by the Georgia Department of Education to provide Professional Learning Units to teachers at *Talking Walls* workshops.
- ⇒ Trained 100 public school teachers through seven week-long *Talking Walls* workshops, on using local historic properties, documents and photographs, and oral histories as teaching tools in social studies, language arts and visual arts lessons.
- ⇒ Planned and hosted a successful organizational meeting of preservation academics statewide initiating a collaboration process.
- ⇒ Planned and implemented the Preservation Professionals Council Seminar in Athens.

- ⇒ Salute to American Craft nets \$152,000.
- ⇒ The 2006 Preservation Ball, *Rolling on the River*, nets \$90,000; chair Dean DuBose Smith, honorary chair Frances (Duffie) Woodruff DuBose set a new record for individual patrons.
- ⇒ Annual Preservation Classic at Peachtree Golf Club nets \$48,000, thanks to the leadership of Allen Nelson and Milton Williams.
- ⇒ Doubled rental income at Rhodes Hall.




